



Rocky Mountain Area Coordination Center Interagency Incident Update

Tomorrow will be the last report of the 2015 Rocky Mountain Area fire season. Subsequent information will be shared if significant activity occurs.

OVERVIEW

Yesterday within the Rocky Mountain Area, initial attack activity was minimal with 3 new fires reported for a total of 8 new acres. Currently, within the Rocky Mountain Area, there are 3 active incidents (BIA, USFS & BLM).

Approximately 100 resources/ 275 people (aircraft, crews, equipment and overhead) are assigned to the Rocky Mountain Area incidents. Nationally, 3,129 resources are assigned to incidents across the United States.
