Predictive Services:	<p>HIGH RISK for Wind Monday Western/Northern NV and Sierra Front... ...Much Cooler with Significant Precipitation Many Areas by Middle of the Week...</p> <p>High pressure across the Great Basin will flatten and be pushed east as a strong low pressure trough drops south into the region. This will allow moisture to move further north into the Great Basin today for scattered showers and thunderstorms to spread across NV and UT and possibly into southern ID. Instability is a little weaker over north central NV, therefore lightning may not be as widespread over northern NV. Cloud cover over western NV and the Sierra this morning may also limit lightning initiation and coverage. Lightning activity later today and tonight may have only light rainfall amounts over parts of the Sierra Front into western/northern NV, especially north of Highway 50.</p> <p>In addition, SW winds will be increasing significantly on Monday ahead of the low moving across Pac NW. Deeper moisture will likely move into the Great Basin Monday through mid-week with more widespread, longer duration wetting rains across much of the region, as a low pressure moves across the area. Lightning can still be expected with these rains. Temperatures will also cool 10-20 degrees from the warm temperatures of this weekend, and drop to below normal.</p> <p>Drier and warmer weather expected later in the week into next weekend, however temperatures will only likely return to near normal.</p>
