Weather update:
Basil

Drier air pushes into the region by this coming weekend and will spread across the Great Basin, including most of Utah...increasing the possibility of lightning holdovers. Temperatures will be on the rise through next week as high pressure dominates the Great Basin. Moisture may start returning from south to north as early as Tuesday next week for a return of thunderstorms, but timing, coverage and moisture are still uncertain.

- Critical shortage of T1 and T2 Helicopters

- 3529 / 29% / 599 /12.5M
- Active day yesterday, fire moved considerably to the East to the head of the Rock Creek area. Trying to keep the fire from moving down slope onto the Payette.
 - Working on the "Life First" message for all of the personnel.
 - Working with the Sheriff's office on Evacuations
 - Sheriff is standing up his OEC and will be in the IC yurt for face to face
 - Established a shelter location
 - Feeding the MM14 fire from the Pioneer caterer. This puts the numbers up to almost 1000 personnel for meals.
 - Real time IR system with the Idaho National Guard on the Beta Test. Very useful as they were looking for people to evacuate the critical areas.
 - Road system is extensive and will require lots of effort for sweeping the roads – ordered 22 Security Specialists
