

STAGE I FIRE RESTRICTIONS

When high temperatures and dry conditions increase the threat of wildfires, fire-use restrictions are implemented to reduce the risk of human-caused fires. Fire restrictions are applied in stages, and become more prohibitive as fire danger increases.

FIRES OR CHARCOAL



Prohibited: No building, maintaining, attending or using a fire, campfire or stove fire in UNDEVELOPED or DISPERSED campsites (sites in which a temporary/rock fire ring has been constructed). NO UNATTENDED CAMPFIRE ANYWHERE, ANYTIME.



Exceptions: Building, maintaining, attending or using a fire in constructed, permanent fire pits or pedestal grills in DEVELOPED recreation sites is allowed. Propane grills, stoves, lanterns, and other camping equipment with an off/on switch is allowed.

SMOKING



Prohibited: Smoking outside an enclosed vehicle or building.

Exceptions: You can smoke in an enclosed vehicle or building, a developed recreation site, or while stopped in an area at least 3 feet in diameter that is barren or cleared of all flammable materials. Never throw a cigarette on the ground or from the window of a vehicle. Never walk away from lit cigarettes and other smoking materials. Put cigarettes out all the way, every time. Use an ashtray or fill a non-combustible (metal, clay) container with sand or water to extinguish smoking materials.
