

I. INTRODUCTION

In the Cody Zone, significant drying of fuels occurred late in June and carried through July and August. This was due to high temperatures and minimal precipitation, coupled with an abundance of dead or dying fuels. As a result, high elevation fires were the norm for 2003.

The Zone hosted five Type II incidents. Two became complexes. The Zone Multiagency Coordinating Group was activated for July and August. The Group communicated via weekly conference calls. Resource requests processed by CDC increased from the previous two years. This was due to our local large fire support. Most Cooperators initiated fire restrictions sometime during the season.

The proposed new dispatch facility is moving through the planning stages. The building site remains the big question. An interagency agreement for the new facility is in draft but has yet to be approved.

II. ADMINISTRATION

STAFF: Personnel from the Shoshone National forest and Bureau of Land Management, Worland Field Office provide year round coverage at CDC.
