

#### 2020 NARRATIVE

2020 brought many challenges to the entire country and most of the world, the Fort Collins Zone was not immune to these struggles. From a global pandemic and a record setting fire year in terms of acreage burned and fire activity never seen before in Colorado history to the implementation of a completely new Resource Ordering System (IROC) in March. Forest fire leadership changes started the new year and Winter RX fire activity was interrupted in mid-March, by the onset of the corona virus pandemic which caused the closure of most federal facilities in the country and mandatory stay at home orders across the state.

The Forest Supervisors office where FTC is located remains closed to begin 2021, with Dispatch being the sole regular occupant. This is because the FS radio network cannot be operated remotely, only hard wired into a Forest Service facility and radio monitoring for aviation assets and field resources remains critical. Most of the Forest and District office staff continue to telework with only essential field operations continuing.

As a result of the stay-at-home orders issued statewide fire restrictions on Forest lands went into effect in April with most counties following suit by July when indices indicated challenging conditions. August saw record setting fire danger indices for several wx stations across the zone and an increase in fire activity on the western slope occupying many of the regions prepositioned resources and on Aug. 13<sup>th</sup> a Human Caused fire started near Cameron Peak in the Rawah Wilderness in the North western portion of the forest. Very active fire behavior was observed immediately upon discovery and the next day a new start, also believed to be human caused was discovered in the southern portion Grand County in the Williams Fork valley.

The Cameron Peak Fire hosted 9 Interagency Incident Management Teams and burned 208,913 acres, destroying 461 structures. The Williams fork fire hosted 5 Interagency Incident Management Teams and burned over 14,000 acres. The Calwood / Lefthand fires were managed together by a Type 2 IMT and burned a total of 10,566 acres.

In early October, a new start was discovered west of the FTC zone on the Routt NF, a T3 incident management organization assembled and were engaged when on the 21<sup>st</sup> of Oct. a wind event caused the East Troublesome fire to cross containment lines and run more than 60,000 acres overnight, burning into Rocky Mountain NP and crossing the continental divide, evacuating Estes Park.

The FTC zone elevated to PL4 then 5 in August and did not drop back to PL3 until December. The Cameron Peak fire was turned back to the local unit on Dec. 12<sup>th</sup> and controlled on Jan. 12<sup>th</sup>.








#### 2020 ALL INCIDENTS BY TYPE 1,183 Total












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
#### TOTAL # OF INCIDENTS BY TIME OF DAY








#### TOTAL # OF INCIDENTS BY FEDERAL AGENCY








#### TOTAL # OF INCIDENTS BY COUNTY






#### FIRES AND ACRES BY FEDERAL AGENCY

#### 2020 RESOURCE ORDERS

In March of 2020, the Resource Ordering and Status System (ROSS) was decommissioned, and the new Resource ordering system Interagency Resource Ordering Capability (IROC) was deployed.

This transition resulted in challenges that were to be expected, however they proved to be more widespread and longer lasting than anticipated.

Among the many challenges faced was the lack of available training prior to deployment, which occurred just prior to mandatory stay at home orders, making training more difficult. Many resources did not migrate over for a variety of issues, some of which required great effort to investigate. Other challenges included utilizing preposition incidents and rostering, which caused National direction in June, to stop the rostering of resources, yet some Geographic Areas continued to do so, thus causing inconsistencies in reporting.

Reporting functionality was not restored to the system until late fall, and even then, gaps between what was needed and what was available, persist.

What has been made available has been incorporated into this report, but it should be noted that discrepancies between historical reporting and the newer system exist and as a result, some of these figures may be adjusted, when the full suite of reporting functionality returns to IROC.








#### 2020 DEPARTURE FROM 5 YEAR AVERAGE








#### OVERHEAD BREAKOUT





#### CREW REQUESTS BY TYPE






#### AIRCRAFT REQUESTS IN ZONE BY TYPE












#### ARAPAHO - ROOSEVELT NF TYPE3 HELICOPTER (3PA)




#### ARAPAHO - ROOSEVELT NF TYPE 1 HELICOPTER


