# 2022 Year in Review

For the most part, the 2022 fire season was an average fire season when compared to previous fire seasons across the Fort Collins Dispatch (FTC) Zone. We continued to work on the Marshall Fire through the first part of January and then there was a lull in fire activity until the end of March when the fire season started in earnest.

There were 95 wildfires reported within the Fort Collins Dispatch Zone, which is up from the 2021 fire season of 73 wildfires. Out of the 95 reported wildfires, 66 were human caused (69%) and 29 were caused by lightning (31%). The total acres burned across the zone was 13,458.3, however 92% of those acres (12,381.37 acres) were on the Eastern Plains. Human caused fires accounted for the highest number of acres burned with a total of 13,074.1 acres. There were 384.2 acres burned across the zone due to lightning caused fires.

Excluding the Eastern Plains, there were only five wildfires over 100 acres. These included:

- NCAR fire in Boulder County burned 189 acres on March 26<sup>th</sup>
- 37E fire in Larimer County burned 117 acres on April 15<sup>th</sup>
- Halligan 1 in Larimer County burned 160 acres on June 27<sup>th</sup>
- County Road 7 in Larimer County burned 100 acres on July 9<sup>th</sup>
- CR21 in Larimer County burned 212 acres on September 8<sup>th</sup>






37E Fire as seen from FNL SEAT Base






# Fort Collins Zone WildCAD Incidents


Fort Collins Interagency Dispatch Center processed 858 WildCAD incidents in 2022. Wildfires, aircraft tracking, processing resource orders, and miscellaneous incidents account for 83% of the WildCAD incidents.


Aircraft tracking includes flight following any aircraft flying within or coming into or out of the FTC Zone. Resource order processing takes the most time for our dispatchers. We processed a total of 985 resources orders to move resources into and out of the FTC Zone.


Most of the workload (33%) in WildCAD were classified as miscellaneous incident types (282 incidents). Miscellaneous incidents are further broken down into the following categories: training, campfires, radio/phone/computer issues, weather warnings (red flag, flash flood, high wind, etc.), severity/support, Region 2 In and Out Board (R2IOB), project work, Rocky Mountain Area Coordination Center (RMACC) aircraft extensions, RMACC crew extensions, and ARF extensions.


Weather warnings accounted for the largest number of miscellaneous incidents, with 107 (12% of all the incidents and 38% of the miscellaneous incidents). At the beginning of the year, the majority of the weather warnings were for red flag/fire weather or high winds. Once spring came along, the warnings were more for flash flooding. Extensions, campfires, and tracking overdue Forest personnel (R2IOB) made up most (121) of the other miscellaneous incidents FTC worked on.



The ARF extended Forest resources 20 times from April to October. There was a total of seven fires that occurred across the zone after 1800 during this timeframe; only one of those was started on the ARF, the other six were wildfires on county lands.


# Fort Collins Zone Resource Orders<sup>2</sup>

Fort Collins Dispatch processed 985 resource orders: 441 for ordering resources into the FTC Zone and 544 for sending resources out of the FTC Zone.

To support the ARF, we ordered in a Community Mitigation Assistance Team (CMAT) in June. The CMAT worked with the ARF and the community of Evergreen to discuss future mitigation efforts that could be done within and adjacent to the community to combat large scale catastrophic wildfires such as the Marshall fire.




## In Zone Resource Requests










# Fort Collins Zone Fire Danger


For the 2022 fire season, National Fire Danger Rating System (NFDRS) fire business thresholds were developed for the 'fire season' and 'shoulder season' for each of the five fire danger rating areas (FDRA): East Plains, West Plains, Foothills, East Divide, and West Divide. Adjective ratings appeared to be a bit better than they were for the 2021 fire season, but still seemed to be overpredicting. The shoulder season, using Burning Index (BI), seemed to be the most overpredicted.

The 2022 Fire Danger Operating Plan (FDOP) is broken down into a fire season and a shoulder season. The fire season for the Foothills, East Divide, and West Divide FDRAs generally covers the period of June – September; for the East and West Plains FDRASs it's generally September – April. The shoulder season for the Foothills, East Divide, and West Divide FDRAs generally covers the period of October – May; there is no shoulder season for the East and West Plains FDRAs.

The year began with steady moisture through about mid-March. This moisture helped reduce the drought across the zone. From mid-March thru April, we received very little moisture which is shown with the uptick in wildfires during this time period. were pretty good snowstorm that helped reduce the dry conditions from January to the beginning of March. A good snowstorm in mid-March helped to decrease the drought conditions across the zone.









The mountainous areas of the FTC zone continued to get moisture through mid-October. The Eastern Plains were the exception, those areas saw less moisture causing the drought to worsen during the same time period.

Heavy rains began to again become an issue over the 2020 Cameron Peak burn scar area in mid-July and early August. On July 15<sup>th</sup>, a thunderstorm set up over the Buckhorn Canyon area west of Fort Collins causing catastrophic flooding and leading to two fatalities. The same area was hit again on August 5<sup>th</sup> causing major damage to county roads.


By fall, the moisture began to dry up once again creating dry conditions and increasing drought severity going into winter.










#### Indices Charts for Each Fire Danger Rating Area with 2022 Overlayed for Comparison




















#### **Fort Collins Zone Aviation Summary**

The ARP managed two helicopters over the 2022 fire season, H-126BH (Type 3) and H-405AJ (Type 1). H-6BH was on an exclusive use (EU) contract for the Northern Colorado Helitack crew. H-5AJ was on a call when needed (CWN) legacy 180-day mandatory availability period (MAP) contract. H-6BH started the contract off in R9 and then supported incidents across the RMA GACC before finishing up their contract in R6. H-5AJ spent the majority of the season within the RMA GACC.
